All wished her much success as she returns to her home state of New York due to complications in her life as a result of last year's hurricanes.

Susan joined the ELCL staff in 1994 as the Children's Librarian. Over the years, she expanded programming and other offerings in many areas as the library grew in size. A Children's Room, a Teen Room and a Children's Garden were added to the building. Susan was also instrumental in expanding STREAM (science, technology, reading, engineering, arts, math) programming and introducing genealogy programs and assistance. More recently, she coordinated the highly successful Passport Service at the library.

Susan accomplished all of this with a smile and a friendly word for everyone. Her warmth and welcoming manner endeared her to everyone, and she will be sincerely missed.

Lois became Director of ELCL in September





Did you know?....

- THE TRADITION OF LIBRARY CATS began in ancient Egypt where cats were known to be domesticated and trained to keep rodents away from fragile manuscripts. In medieval Europe, library cats were also highly favored for their rodent hunting skills, keeping mice and rats from chewing on vellum, the material used in manuscripts.
- THERE ARE ALSO LIBRARY BATS at work protecting books. At the University of Coimbra in Portugal, a colony of bats make their home behind the bookshelves as welcomed guests. Each night they swoop through the stacks snapping up bugs that might otherwise feed on book pages.
- A FACILITIES MANAGER has been added to the ELCL staff to keep the building and grounds in tip top shape. Charles Russo began his duties in November and has already had significant impact.
